PANTHERS FINISH THE CAA ERA

Georgia State played its final year in the CAA, regular season only, due to the specific rule for the conference tournament for departing teams. The CAA lost GSU, ODU and George Mason on July 1, 2013 after seeing VCU leave the league a year earlier.

RECORD UPDATES

Individually, Cody Paulk led the CAA and was No. 15 in the NCAA in blocked shots with 77 (2.66). She broke the school record of 67 blocks set by Marcquitta Head in 2006-07. The 77 blocks tied for sixth most in a single season in CAA history.

Paulk's 210 blocked shots make her fifth all-time in CAA history. She shattered the old GSU career mark of 166 by Rhian Jones (1992-96).

Junior guard Kendra Long has made 165 3-point baskets in her three years, surpassing the school career mark of 154 by Kelcey Roegiers-Jensen (2003-07). Long will add to that in 2013-14 in her senior year.

Sophomore Ashley Watson shot 87.5% from the free throw line to edge past Marica Maddox's previous school record of 87.4% on her final free throw of the year. She made 70-of-80 after Maddox had made 76-of-87. Watson was No. 18 in the NCAA.

TWO SENIORS FINISH CAREERS

This year's team had just two seniors: Tiffany Anderson and Cody Paulk. Anderson averaged 3.9 points per game, while Paulk netted 9.7 points a game. Anderson grabbed 4.2 rebounds and Paulk pulled down 8.3 per game. That leaves one junior, four sophomores and three freshmen to return, along with the transfers who sat out their season, as well as three freshmen post recruits. Additional signees could join this spring.

20 STRAIGHT FREE THROWS

GSU set a new school record for consecutive free throws made when the Panthers hit their first 20 of the game at Towson on Jan. 13. That broke the old mark of 17 straight set against Stetson on Feb. 24, 2001 at the GSU Sports Arena.

GSU didn't miss a free throw until 39 seconds remained in the game and it was the team's best shooter, Ashley Watson (who made a school record for the season). GSU finished 22-of-25 in that game.

ROSTER BALANCE

All 10 players logged 325 or more minutes, with eight of the 10 starting games. Nine of the 10 scored in double figures.

GEORGIA STATE 64, UCF 50

UCF Arena • Orlando, Fla.

Georgia State opened the 2012-13 season with a 64-50 win over UCF with four players scoring in double figures.

The visiting Panthers' defense was the difference as GSU forced 28 turnovers, made 15 steals, blocked five shots and held host UCF to 29 percent shooting for the game.

Junior guard Kendra Long scored 15 points, making three-of-five 3-point baskets to top the scoring and four steals to pace the defense.

Sophomore guard Kayla Nolan had a double-double with 12 rebounds and 11 points. Senior center Cody Paulk was a major factor with 10 points, six rebounds and five blocked shots. Point guard Ashley Watson added 12 points.

UCF of Conference USA got 18 points from guard Briahanna Jackson and 10 points from guard Geneviva Carter.

"We came out of the gate playing well tonight," head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "We got 34 points off the turnovers and our defensive pressure was the difference, especially in the first half. We held them to a low shooting percentage and got some important steals to lead to baskets in transition."

Georgia State opened a 4-0 lead to start the game, followed one UCF trey and then scored 13 straight points to make it 17-3 at 15:30 as Long drained a 3 to create that margin.

The hot Panthers built the margin to 31-13 with 7:12 to go in the half. GSU held a 39-24 lead at halftime, holding UCF to 25 percent shooting.

In the second half, GSU built the lead to 20 points quickly at 48-28 and had the largest lead of the night of 24 points at 52-28 with 16:24 to go.

GSU shot 43 percent for the game, after starting out making 10 of its first 19 shots. GSU finished with a 43-41 rebounding advantage and got 10 points off second-chance offensive rebounds.

GSU got 50 minutes of support from the five bench players in this evening's opener. The Panthers finished with a 43-41 rebound advantage.

FLORIDA 84, GEORGIA STATE 65

O'Connell Center • Gainesville, Fla.

Florida pulled away from a scrappy Georgia State team to post an 84-65 win Sunday afternoon.

Visiting GSU (1-1) won the rebound battle, 49-45, got off more shots, 73-69, but shot just 33 percent from the field in one of the big differences.

Host Florida shot 44 percent and got to the free throw line 25 times, making 17, while GSU got to the line just 14 times and made 12.

GSU forced 23 Florida turnovers, made eight steals and blocked three shots.

Kayla Nolan led GSU with 13 points, while Kendra Long netted 11 points, despite making just 5-of-18 shots. Cody Paulk led with 12 rebounds and also added nine points.

Florida (2-0) got 19 points from All-SEC forward Jennifer George in her first game of the season, while guard Jaterra Bonds added 17 more points.

Georgia State trailed 37-25 at halftime, with Florida breaking from a 10-10 tie at 12:06 to a 25-12 advantage at 7:07 with a 15-2 run. GSU attempted 41 shots to the Gators' 29, but made just 11 for a 26.8 shooting percentage. Hustling GSU held a 30-20 rebound first half rebound advantage.

The game was 8-8 after the first seven minutes and 10-10 thru eight minutes. The Panthers trailed 16-12 after 11 minutes against the No. 24 RPI Gators.

"I think we rushed our shots a little today because we had a lot of open looks we should have made," coach Baldwin-Tener said.

"I was pleased with the effort in the first half, but I think we looked a little ragged in the second half," she continued. "We did a pretty good job of rebounding, but we could have done even better, even though we had the advantage for the game."

"Obviously, our defense wasn't as good as it needs to be and they had lots of sneak out baskets when they got a long pass and easy lay-up."

"It was a good road trip to be coming home at 1-1 and now we hope to get back in a winning groove with a stretch of home games."

Georgia State's formula for getting a 79-50 win over Jacksonville State was the same as it had been last week in getting a season opening road win: start fast and strike quickly.

Ignited by a 13-2 burst to start the game in the first five and a half minutes, GSU built that to 20-5 at 13:37 and up to 30-10 at 9:02 and the path to victory was established. That was similar to the 17-3 start last week in the win at UCF.

Tonight, GSU used its aggressive defense to force 25 JSU turnovers, made 14 steals, held JSU to 26.9 percent shooting and blocked five shots.

Center Cody Paulk scored 18 points, grabbed 12 rebounds and blocked 6 shots to lead GSU to a 73-48 victory over Georgia Southern in the opening game of Georgia State Thanksgiving Tournament.

Florida A&M came from behind at halftime to defeat Kent State, 70-56.

Georgia State (3-1) used its aggressive defense to open a quick 14-4 lead and a 22-7 advantage through the game's first 11 minutes. GSU led 34-18 at halftime by holding visiting Georgia Southern to 14.3 percent shooting (4-of-28). Georgia State finished by holding the Eagles to just 34.2 percent for the game (15-of-62).

"I think our defensive pressure affected them early on and was a big key in today's win," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "We rushed them into some bad shots and that helped us get the job done on defense today."

Georgia State's defense has held all three opponents to 50 points or fewer in starting the season 3-1. Today, GSU forced 15 turnovers and blocked 10 shots.

Offensively, GSU had three players in double figures, led by Paulk's 18 on 8-of-12 shooting in her 22 minutes. Sophomore guard Kayla Nolan added 15 points in her 23 minutes and freshman guard Ashlee Cole contributed 13 more points in her 22 minutes. The Panthers shot 47 percent for the game.

Georgia State dominated the boards with a 52-37 rebound advantage, paced by Paulk's 12 rebounds and Maryam Dogo's 11 caroms. Georgia State's bench scored 41 of the 73 points today. "We have extra firepower off the bench no matter who starts or who comes in later. Everyone is contributing when they are in the game."

"We are not depending on one person to lead us in scoring this year and we have plenty of firepower," Baldwin-Tener added. "Paulk was solid on defense and altered a lot of their shot selection today. Offensively, she has the range to shoot those mid-range jumpers as well as drive to the rim."

Georgia State improved to 4-1 and won its the GSU Thanksgiving Tournament with a 77-58 win over Florida A&M on Saturday afternoon. In the earlier consolation game, Georgia Southern defeated Kent State, 71-47.

The script for GSU was the same as in all four wins, pounce quickly with aggressive defense to build a double-digit lead. The host Panthers struck with vengeance, taking an 8-0 lead in two and a half minutes and making it 16-3 through the first seven minutes. GSU never let up until it had a 41-18 halftime cushion by holding the Rattlers to 18 percent first half shooting.

Four players scored in double figures, led by sophomore forward Maryam Dogo's 16 points, 11 rebounds and two blocked shots coming off the bench. Sophomore guard Kendra Long netted 13 points, grabbed seven rebounds, made four assists and had three steals. Senior center Cody Paulk added 12 more points to go with seven rebounds and three blocked shots. Sophomore point guard Ashley Watson contributed 12 points and seven assists.

Florida A&M was led by Jasmine Grice, who scored 30 points by making 13 of her 30 shots with 21 of those point coming in the second half.

GSU held Florida A&M to 32 percent shooting for the game, while dominating the Rattlers on the boards with a 55-32 rebound advantage that included 20 offensive caroms. The host Panthers were effective from the free throw line, making 21 of their 25 shots for an 84 percent rate.

"Our first-half defense was solid and the key to our win today," head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener noted. "This was a team win with the defense sparking the quick start and the offense being aggressive to get second-chance baskets if we needed."

Cody Paulk was named the Thanksgiving Tournament Most Valuable Player with 40 points, 19 rebounds and nine blocked shots in the two games. Joining her on the All-Tournament team were teammates Maryam Dogo and Kendra Long, along with Florida A&M's Jasmine Grice, Georgia Southern's Mimi DuBose and Kent State's Melanee Stubbs.

Georgia State held Kennesaw State to 27 percent shooting in carving out a fourth straight win, 63-42, Sunday afternoon.

State started with a 7-0 lead and didn't allow KSU its first basket until 13:26 in the first half and was never seriously threatened. GSU led 16-6 in allowing only three baskets after 12 minutes of play. KSU had a six-point surge to close to 20-12 at 4:43, but GSU went on a decisive 13-0 run to make it 33-12 with one minute left in the first half. A trey by KSU made it 33-15 at halftime.

In the second half, the Panthers held the lead into the twenty-point range and held a 47-27 advantage at 10:58 when KSU made its final try to narrow it to 14 points at 47-33 with 8:52. GSU scored six straight to push it back to 20 points at 53-33 with 6:39. The host Panthers built the largest lead of 27 points at 63-36 with 1:45.

GSU's defense, No. 18 in the nation in field goal defense (31.8) dropped that even lower with today's 15-of-55 shots at the 27.3 rate. Outside the arc, GSU is No. 3 in the nation at 15.9 percent and KSU managed just 16.7 percent today on 2 of 12.

Georgia State forced 19 Kennesaw turnovers, made 10 steals and blocked four shots. GSU held a 38-35 rebound advantage.

For the winners, Cody Paulk had 11 points, seven rebounds and two blocked shots, Kayla Nolan had 11 points and three steals, while Kendra Long added 10 more points to lead GSU. Tiffany Anderson had eight rebounds to lead the team today and freshman Morgan Jackson had a personal-best seven rebounds coming off the bench.

Kennesaw got 12 points and nine rebounds from Sametria Gideon as she closed with a pair of layups in the closing minute to get into double figures.

Georgia State shot 50.8 percent on offense, making 30 of its 59 shots, including 57.7 percent in the first half. GSU pounded the ball inside with 42 points scored in the paint.

"We tried to be intense and aggressive, forcing them to take hurried or bad shots and for the most part were pretty effective," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said.

Georgia State, which led the nation in 3-point field goal defense allowing 16 percent, ran into a red-hot Belmont team that made 9-of-15 3-pointers (60 percent). That was a major difference in Belmont's 85-62 win in a noon game.

The game turned at the 14-minute mark. Belmont was holding a 48-45 lead when whistles started blowing frequently. GSU had four personals in about 50 seconds, plus a pair of technicals in a five-minute span on coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener that led to her ejection. That 48-45 lead grew to 62-45 at 9:22 with Molly Ernst hitting three consecutive 3-point baskets for Belmont in its 17-0 five-minute run.

An 11-day layoff for finals showed early for GSU as their pressure defense did not force a Belmont turnover until 13 minutes into the game. The Panthers, who came into the game shooting 43.3 percent, hit just 39.6 percent today. Ernest, who averaged 8 points a game coming in, scored 23 today with 7-of-10 3-point baskets today.

The loss ends Georgia State's four-game winning streak. The win for Belmont followed its win over Indiana and ran its winning streak to three games.

Georgia State got 13 points and six rebounds from sophomore guard Kayla Nolan. Maryam Dogo added 10 points and eight rebounds off the bench, while junior guard Kendra Long added 10 more points.

The Panthers started with a 4-0 lead and the game was tied at 14-14 after seven minutes. A Belmont 12-0 scoring run gave the Bruins a 26-14 lead at 8:41. GSU closed to 37-31, but Belmont took a 42-31 lead into halftime.

In the second half, GSU came out stronger on defense and outscored Belmont 14-4 to make it 48-45 when the whistles helped Belmont gain a lot more momentum.

The game included 39 fouls, plus two technicals, with 53 free throw attempts combined. But, for all the calls, it was probably the non-calls that had Coach Baldwin-Tener agitated the most in her rare ejection during her 14-year career.

Georgia State held a 35-34 rebound advantage, but forced just 11 turnovers, almost half its normal average. GSU had eight steals and four blocked shots.

Kayla Nolan notched her second career double-double with 10 points and 11 rebounds to lead a balanced effort as Georgia State defeated Morehead State, 61-47, on Sunday

Tiffany Anderson contributed 11 points and six rebounds for the Panthers, who improved to 6-2 on the season. Cody Paulk added nine points, seven boards, three steals and two blocked shots for GSU.

"Tiffany Anderson really showed a lot of leadership today," said GSU assistant coach Adrienne Shuler. "She was aggressive, offensively and on the boards, and that generated a lot of second and third opportunities. When she plays like that, she is huge for us."

Shuler served as head coach for this game with GSU head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener serving a one-game suspension, per Colonial Athletic Association policy, after she received two technical fouls in the Panthers' last game.

Georgia State used aggressive defense to force 21 Morehead State turnovers and limit the Eagles to 28 percent shooting from the field, including just 6-for-36 from 3-point range. The Panthers also held the advantage on the boards, 50-37.

GSU led 28-18 at the half after holding the Eagles to just 6-for-29 shooting from the field and forcing 16 MSU turnovers. The Panthers led 24-8 with seven minutes to play in the first half before allowing Morehead State to close the gap with a 9-4 run.

Early in the second half, Morehead State pulled within six points at 33-27, but Georgia State quickly responded with eight straight points in less than a minute to reestablish a 14-point lead. The run was fueled by back-to-back steals in the backcourt by Kendra Long and Miranda Smith that produced easy layups. The Panthers maintained their double-digit advantage the rest of the way.

Terrice Robinson led Morehead State with 10 points, and Casey Ryans added nine points and rebounds but the Eagles fell to 1-9.

The Panthers improved to 5-0 at home by holding a fifth team under 30% shooting and a fifth team under 50 points scored on the season.

Georgia State improved to 6-0 at home and 7-2 overall with a 64-45 win over Western Carolina on Friday evening.

As the storylines for its seven wins have all gone this year, Georgia State built a big double-digit halftime lead with its good defense and coasted on to the victory. Tonight, GSU opened a 34-19 halftime lead and never looked back.

"When you hold a team to 19 points in the first half, you certainly put yourself in a position to go get a win," head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener noted. "Having all 10 players contribute significantly helps us in all facets of the wins. But you can win with good defense, whether it is at the start of a game or making the key stop in the last 30 seconds of a game, so defense has always been a point of emphasis for us."

In shutting down the Catamounts in the first half, GSU forced 16 turnovers, made 10 steals, blocked three shots and held WCU to 28% in the opening half. The Panthers went on to finish with 20 forced turnovers, 12 steals, five blocks and allowed WCU to convert on just 31.6% of its shots, 23.1% outside the 3-point arc.

Junior guard Kendra Long led GSU's scoring with 13 points, buoyed by 3-of-4 baskets outside the 3-point line. GSU started the game with a 13-0 run over the first four minutes before MVSU finally scored at 15:25. The host Panthers led 31-11 with five minutes to go in the half. GSU led 47-22 at the half. The Panthers built the lead to as large as 32 points, 58-26, before MVSU kept chipping away to the finish.

GSU's bench logged 90 minutes and the starters 110 minutes as Coach Baldwin-Tener used everybody extensively.

Georgia State held a 44-28 rebound advantage, while the Panther defense forced 21 turnovers and made 11 steals. GSU made 7-of-15 3-point baskets today, including 5-of-9 in the first half.

"We have got to have the same intensity whether we are up 30 points or down 30 points and we didn't have that all 40 minutes today," Coach Baldwin-Tener said. "I am glad to win by double figures, but I didn't like the way we finished in the second half."

"Tiffany Anderson had a good game and am proud of her leadership," Baldwin-Tener said. "She made the extra pass, she hit the boards, the shot the ball well and led the team when she was in the game."

"Our aggressive defense again got us started strong, but we tried other defenses with the young kids and we didn't figure those defenses out very quickly," Baldwin-Tener added. "We were too sloppy on both ends in the final 10 minutes."

The Panthers have led in double figures at halftime in all eight wins. The 25-point first half margin topped the 23-point lead against Florida A&M earlier this season.

Toledo (12-1) came from behind to defeat Georgia State, 46-43, to win the Holiday & Hoops Tournament.

GSU led from the 4-minute mark in the first half and didn't lose the lead until 8:06 left in the game, a span of 16 minutes with the upper hand. With the score tied at 15 in the first half, GSU got the lead, 17-15, and then led 22-20 at halftime. GSU built its lead to seven at 27-20 and still led by six at 36-30 with 10:48 to play. When Ashlee Cole hit a jumper with 8:33 to make it 38-35, that would be GSU's final basket until 1:50. That basket at 1:50 brought GSU back to within 42-40.

The win was Toledo's 11th consecutive.

The physical game was won at the free throw line as Toledo converted 11-of-16 charity tosses to just 2-of-6 for the home Panthers. GSU suffered with three players having four fouls, including Tiffany Anderson, who had three in the first half as she tried to follow yesterday's double-double game, but spent more time on the bench, playing just six minutes of the first half. Anderson did not score today.

Georgia State, ranked in the top 25 in many defensive categories, held Toledo, which is No. 19 in national RPI rankings in check for most of the game. GSU limited Toledo to just 25.8% field goals (16-of-62), to just 3-of-15 (20%) outside the arc, while making eight steals and blocking seven shots against the bigger and more physical Rockets.

But, GSU struggled itself against Toledo's tough defense. GSU shot just 19-of-60 (31.7%) and had 17 turnovers. Toledo ended up with a 47-43 rebound advantage.

Nolan had a double-double with 13 points and 11 rebounds. Cody Paulk tied her personal best with six blocked shots to move into the top 10 in CAA history with 165 career blocks. Paulk is one shy of the GSU school career record.

After Toledo jumped out to a 5-0 lead, GSU came right back to tie the game at 9-9. The score was tied three more times at 11, 13 and 15 before Georgia State got the lead it would maintain until the closing minutes.

The Holiday & Hoops All-Tournament team included Charlotte's Hillary Sigmon and Jennifer Halley, Georgia State's Tiffany Anderson and Cody Paulk, along with Toledo's Yolanda Richarson. Toledo's Zangoura was Tournament MVP.

OLD DOMINION 72, GEORGIA STATE 66

Old Dominion rallied from a 20-point second-half deficit to earn a 72-66 victory over Georgia State in the Colonial Athletic Association opener for both teams Sunday.

Georgia State's (8-4, 0-1 CAA) Cody Paulk recorded a double-double with 11 points and 15 rebounds, and the senior blocked three shots to become the Panthers' career leader with 168. Kendra Long added 15 points. Galaisha Goodhope came off the bench to score 21 points, 19 in the second half including two key buckets in the final minute, to lead the Monarchs (10-3, 1-0 CAA).

Host GSU carved out a 35-24 halftime lead by holding ODU to 28.6% shooting, forcing 13 turnovers and making six steals, while shooting 44.8 percent from the floor themselves in the opening half.

In the second half, GSU came out with a 15-6 run in the first seven minutes to build a 50-30 lead with 13:16 left to play.

Old Dominion began its furious comeback with a pair of back-to-back 3-point shots from Tiffany Minor and Ashley Betz-White. GSU still maintained control and led by 53-42 with just 8:43 left in the game.

But, ODU continued to chip away with takeaways and poor GSU shooting. ODU eventually got the lead at 5:54 on an old-fashioned 3-point play of a basket and free throw by Goodhope. GSU tied the game at 58 with 5:03 to go on a basket by Kayla Nolan.

ODU led by 61-60 with four minutes to play when GSU missed an open lay-up that would have given them the lead back. It was still a one-point game with 47.8 seconds when Kendra Long converted two free throws to pull GSU back to 67-66. But, the hot-shooting Goodhope hit a jumper with 23 seconds and then added some later closing seconds free throws to secure the win for the visiting Monarchs.

From that 50-30 lead at 13:16, ODU outscored GSU 42-16 in that span and 48-31 in the half. In that second half, GSU shot just 27.6 percent on 8-of-29, many of them lay-ups.

Georgia State finished with a 43-35 rebound advantage with 18 offensive rebounds. GSU's defense forced 21 ODU turnovers and made 11 steals with three blocks. ODU's defense forced 26 GSU turnovers with 12 steals and four blocks.

Georgia State came from 17 points down and had the ball with 11 seconds and the chance to win, but misfired on its final attempt and lost a 64-63 decision to Hofstra Thursday.

Trailing 64-53 with 5:11 to play, GSU shut down Hofstra without another point and continued to close the gap on offense. Kayla Nolan scored with 1:40 left to make it 64-63.

With 1:00 on the clock and with the ball under their basket to go ahead, GSU threw the ball away. A defensive stop gave GSU another chance with 39 seconds left, but a backdoor layup was blocked without a foul by Shante Evans.

When Annie Payton missed the front end of a 1-and-1 with 16.1 seconds, GSU had yet another chance. With 11 seconds left, GSU had the ball in front of its bench and basket with the chance to pull off the win. But, a delayed offense ended up in a long shot by Ashley Watson that bounced off the side of the rim.

The one-point margin made all the more important the buzzer beating 3-point shot at the end of the first half by Hofstra's Andreana Thomas that was reviewed and counted to break a tie and give Hofstra a 34-31 lead at the break. Those three points obviously loomed large later. There had been seven lead changes and four ties in the back-and-forth first half.

Hofstra started the second half with a 13-0 run to build the lead to 47-31 at 16:46. The Pride (6-7, 2-0 and on a five-game win streak) took advantage with Evans in the paint when Paulk had to sit for a few minutes with a sprained ankle. Hofstra had its largest lead of 51-34 at 12:23.

Georgia State (8-5, 0-2) controlled the boards with a 47-40 rebound advantage, including 18 offensive boards. GSU hurt itself by making just 12-of-20 free throws (60%) and missing front ends of one-and-one situations.

Cody Paulk led GSU with 14 points, eight rebounds, five steals and two blocks in her 32 minutes. But, the minutes she was out with the ankle sprain was crucial during that 13-0 Pride run with Evans scoring down low.

GSU forced 21 Hofstra turnovers and made 11 steals to go with three blocks. Hofstra, who leads the CAA in steals, had 10 this evening and forced 20 GSU turnovers. Both teams capitalized on the takeaways, with GSU scoring 22 points off turnovers and Hofstra 20 points.

Georgia State used clutch free throw shooting and good defense to earn a 56-49 road win at Towson on Sunday afternoon.

The visiting Panthers (9-5, 1-2) made 20 free throws in a row before a miss and finished the game 22-for-25 at the charity stripe (88%). The defense gave GSU an early lead that they kept all second half long as the team recorded 14 steals, forced 19 turnovers, blocked four shots and kept Towson to a 36.7 shooting percentage.

Junior guard Kendra Long enjoyed a career-high scoring game with 23 points, two more than her previous best, with three 3-point baskets and 12-of-14 from the line. Long also added six steals, another personal-best effort. Sophomore point guard Ashley Watson added 10 points with 8-of-9 free throws. Center Cody Paulk was a factor with eight rebounds, six points, three blocks and two steals. Freshman Morgan Jackson came off the bench with seven timely points and four rebounds in her 11 minutes.

GSU had an eight-point first half lead that shrunk to two points at 22-20. But, the Panthers roared out of the locker room with an 11-1 run in the first three minutes to build a 33-21 lead at 16:58.

GSU led by 14 points at 10:42 (46-32) as Towson tried to fight back. The host Tigers got the lead back to six points with 1:44 to play (50-44).

Long made two free throws at 52.6 to run the string to 20 free throws in a row. With 39 seconds left, GSU's Watson missed the first free throw of the game and Towson hit one at the other end to close to 54-49 with 30 seconds.

Long missed a free throw with 24 seconds, made a key steal and then converted two more free throws with 10.4 seconds to seal the win.

"That was nice to finally win a close one and should give us some confidence," head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "Kendra Long was the key performer today and she sucked it up for us and played all 40 minutes in a great effort. This was another good defensive effort with steals and forcing them to do what we wanted. We took a little better care of the ball ourselves. And Morgan Jackson came in and gave us some key plays today."

Northeastern shot 55 percent in the first half to spark themselves to a 68-55 win over Georgia State Thursday night.

Listening to Georgia State head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener post-game, it was a case of the good, the bad and the ugly. The good was Northeastern's first-half shooting as the No. 12 3-point shooting team knocked down seven of their first 11 treys to build a 41-30 halftime lead. The bad and the ugly all belonged to Georgia State, which shot just 2-of-19 outside the 3-point arc, was outrebounded 38-31, and didn't defend much all night according to the coach.

"We didn't guard them all night and were especially lackadaisical in the first half," coach Baldwin-Tener lamented post game. "We talked, we prepared, we practiced and then we just didn't do any of that on the court. We had no intensity from start to finish and I am extremely disappointed in the overall effort. Obviously, Northeastern can shoot the ball as they have all year long and they did in the first half tonight. But, we did not play to win tonight."

The stat sheet reflects some of the effort Coach Baldwin-Tener was speaking of. Georgia State, which entered No. 3 in the NCAA in 3-point defense (.237) was lit up by Northeastern's outside shooters (7-of-12 in the first half alone). GSU, which was No. 43 in the NCAA in blocked shots (4.8) did not have a single one tonight for the only time this season. GSU, which was No. 19 in field goal defense at 33.8%, allowed 47.4% for the game. GSU, which was No. 44 in rebound advantage with a +6.4 average, was a -7 with a 31-38 disadvantage tonight.

Northeastern (10-6, 3-2) grew an 11-9 advantage at 15:06 to a 25-11 lead at 10:35. GSU closed back to six and 27-21 23 at 7:16 and 30-23 at 6:34 when Northeastern made three straight 3-pointers to open a 39-23 lead at 5:05. The Huskies went to the locker room with a 41-30 halftime lead.

In the second half, GSU made its final challenge of the game, reducing the lead to seven points at 47-40 at 14:19 and 51-44 with 9:35 to go. But, Northeastern's 8-0 run with a Kerkhof trey quickly made it 59-44 at 7:00.

A few sprinkles of positives for GSU was its 13-of-15 free throws (86.7%) and 11 steals off 17 Northeastern turnovers.

The Georgia State women's basketball team fell to Colonial Athletic Association foe James Madison, 65-49, Sunday at the GSU Sports Arena.

The Panthers dropped to 9-7 overall, 1-4 in the CAA, while James Madison improved to 10-7, 4-1 in the CAA. The win was the seventh in the last eight games for JMU.

Georgia State trailed just 49-45 after a bucket by Cody Paulk with 5:50 left, but the Dukes scored the next 11 points, including three straight three-point plays, to push their advantage to 60-45 with less than three minutes to go. Tarik Hislop began that 11-0 run with back-to-back three-point plays, then Kirby Burkholder followed with another one, and Jazmon Gwaltney added a jumper.

The Panthers had closed to 38-37 at 10:50 on a drive by Nolan and had a chance to take the lead at 10:20, but missed the layup.

Both teams played solid defense as GSU held the Dukes to 20-for-58 shooting, while the Panthers were almost an identical 20-for-57. GSU did rebound to shoot 46.4% in the second half (13-of-28). But James Madison managed to sink 20 of 21 (96.2%) from the free throw line, compared to just 7-for-13 by GSU.

Kayla Nolan led the Panthers with 13 points, while Cody Paulk added 12 points. Freshman Gaby Moss came off the bench to contribute 10 points, four rebounds and five assists.

Hislop led a trio of Dukes in double figures with 20 points, while Precious Hall scored 18 points, and Burkholder added 17. James Madison had a 44-35 rebound advantage, the largest against GSU this season.

"We did some good things today and played a solid game, but they made plays down the stretch and we didn't. That was the difference in the game," GSU head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said.

The first half featured a defensive battle with both teams shooting below 25 percent from the field, while forcing 25 turnovers between them. James Madison took a 23-17 lead into the locker room on the strength of its 10-for-10 performance from the free throw line, compared to just 2-for-2 for the Panthers.

GSU (9-8, 1-5) knew it would be a little tougher without injured point guard Ashley Watson going against a team that presses full court often.

Then, poor shooting on makeable shots dug a deep hole as ODU grew a 15-15 score at 5:50 in the first half with a 11-0 run to build to a 28-16 halftime lead.

Add to that foul trouble to its two post players, leaving the team to play five players under 5-foot-9 for long stretches.

"We missed so many easy, makeable shots and you have to score way more than 45 points to win a game anywhere, any time," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said.

"Our defense started OK in the first half, holding them to 29% and having more rebounds at halftime (31-22), but when you're not scoring, it is all for naught."

Without its point guard, all the GSU players threw the ball all over the Arena with 28 turnovers, falling on the shoulders of seven of the nine players dressed who had two or more turnovers. It wasn't as much the defense as simply careless and misguided passes, or players being in the wrong place, coach Baldwin-Tener indicated.

Georgia State got 14 points from sophomore guard Kayla Nolan, but she shot just 3-for-12 in doing that. Senior center Cody Paulk, who got her fourth foul with 16:22 to play, still finished with 13 rebounds, five points and two blocks in the 25 minutes she played. Sophomore forward Maryam Dogo added nine rebounds and five points in 19 minutes in her second career start.

Visiting GSU used a 6-0 run to take a 9-6 lead at 15:09 and again at 11-8 at 12:50. GSU went from 5:50 didn't make a field goal the remainder of the half and had just one free throw made at 1:05 in the half.

GSU did hold a 50-41 rebound advantage with 21 offensive rebounds.

Georgia State shot 55.6 percent in the second half to rally from a nine-point halftime deficit and claim a 64-52 win over George Mason in front of 1,942 fans at the Patriot Center.

The visiting Panthers outscored Mason 42-21 in the second half by making 15 of 27 shots and 8-of-10 free throws. Meanwhile, the defense was holding the host Patriots to 20 percent on 4-of-20 field goals and forcing 11 turnovers.

Georgia State (10-8, 2-5) got 18 points from 6-foot-3 center Cody Paulk, 15 of those points coming in the second half. Paulk was 6-for-7 in the second half, while posting a double-double with 12 rebounds to go with the 18 points. She also blocked two shots.

GSU made seven 3-point shots to tie its season high. Four players were in double figures, including Kayla Nolan's 12 points, plus Kendra Long and Miranda Smith's 11 points. Long and Nolan each added four assists.

George Mason (6-12, 1-6) was led by Rahneeka Saunders with 10 points, five rebounds and three assists.

Georgia State wasted no time in the second half, bursting out on a 16-4 run to erase a 31-22 deficit and turn it into a 38-35 lead at 15:49.

Mason rallied to force a tie at 44-44 with 11 minutes left and the teams traded baskets with GSU up 50-48 with 8:09 left. Then, GSU went on a 10-0 over the next four minutes to make it 60-48 with 3:30 to go.

"I am certainly proud of the way the team fought back and it was great to see the shots finally falling for us in the second half," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said.

"At halftime, our plan was to get the ball inside more to Cody Paulk more and the team did that and then she responded with the points," Baldwin-Tener said. "Kendra Long managed the point guard position in the second half and that really helped us since our starting point guard (Ashley Watson) was out."

The three-point shooting was spurred by Long's 3-of-8 as she ended an 0-for-16 slump. Kayla Nolan added a pair of treys, while Ashlee Cole and Miranda Smith each added one.

The Panther offense finally settled down and finished the game with as many assists (15) as turnovers (15), making just five turnovers in the second half.

Delaware rolled to its 12th straight win and 27th straight Colonial Athletic Association win with a 70-38 decision over Georgia State on Thursday evening in the GSU Sports Arena before 738 fans.

For the first 10 minutes of the game, it was back and forth and a close game at 16-13 with 10:56 in the opening stanza when Elena Delle Donne and the Blue Hens went on a 14-0 run over the next five minutes to open a 30-13 lead with 6:24 left in the half. Delle Donne scored eight straight points from 11:17 to 9:16.

All-American Delle Donne scored 25 points in playing 26 of the first 29 minutes of the game before exiting with Delaware up 53-27 with 11 minutes to go in the game. The 6-foot-5 star hit 9-of-19 shots, but was 0-for-2 outside the arc. She added 7-of-8 free throws and six rebounds. Akeema Richards scored 10 points, while Danielle Parker led with 10 rebounds. Delaware (17-3, 8-0 and unbeaten in the 14 games with Delle Donne in the line-up) shot 44% and made 17-of-19 free throws.

Georgia State (10-9, 2-6) was paced by senior center Cody Paulk, who scored 13 points on 6-of-10 shooting, grabbed seven rebounds, tied her personal best with six blocked shots and added two steals. It was Paulk's sixth career game with six blocked shots. GSU made just 6-of-14 FT's and 0-7 3-pointers.

The Panthers were ice cold, shooting just 7-of-24 in the second half (29.2%) and 16-of-52 for the game (30.8%). The 38 points were a season-low for GSU, and the Panthers scored only 17 points in the second half.

Delaware took a 40-21 lead at halftime and completely blew the game open with a 9-0 run that extended a 48-27 margin at 14:20 to a 57-27 lead with 9:47. From 18:30 through 3:58 in the second half, all 10 Delaware baskets were lay-ups.

"Obviously Delaware is a top 25 team and Delle Donne is an All-American, but I am extremely disappointed at the way we lacked intensity and all-out effort tonight," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "We simply didn't give our best effort tonight. I'm sure some of the young kids got discouraged missing so many shots in the first half, but you can't allow yourself to not keep battling hard through the adversity."

Drexel opened the second half with an 11-0 run to turn a 33-31 halftime lead into a quick 44-31 advantage and went on to a 79-55 win over Georgia State on Sunday afternoon.

The Dragons (14-6, 7-2, No. 79 RPI) continued the second half explosion by making eight of its first 11 shots to run it to 55-39 at 11:50 and coasted on for the victory. The Colonial Athletic Association's leading scorer, senior Hollie Mershon, scored 15 in the second half for a game best 25 points. In that second half, Drexel shot 64 percent (16-of-25, including 4-of-8 outside the arc). The Dragons made 10-10 free throws in their 46-point second half. Drexel hit 52.8% for the game.

Visiting Georgia State struck first, opening a 10-7 lead at 14:40 and building that to 15-11 at 11:26, GSU had its final lead at 19-18 at 8:46, when a 3-pointer by Rachel Pearson gave Drexel a lead it would never lose at 21-19. A 3-pointer by Georgia State's Ashlee Cole made it 33-31 for Drexel at the half.

Drexel roared out of the locker room with treys from Mershon and Meghan Creighton to ignite the 11-0 run. It was 65-49 with 5:30 to go, but Drexel finished with a 14-6 run over the final five minutes to produce the largest leads of the game.

Georgia State (10-10) was led by 13 points off the bench from freshman Ashlee Cole, who made three 3-point baskets. Sophomore point guard Ashley Watson returned after missing the last three games with an injury and produced 10 points and four assists. Cody Paulk led with seven rebounds, while adding six points.

In addition to Mershon's 25 points and five assists, Drexel got 20 points from senior forward Taylor Wootton. The Dragons made eight 3-point baskets and 15-of-16 from the free throw line. Drexel had just six turnovers and GSU had just two steals all day.

"Well, Drexel is one of the better teams in the CAA and they shot well in the second half, but I am not pleased with the way we did things, offensively or defensively, in the second half," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "We hurt ourselves with mental mistakes on both ends of the court and that had nothing to do with Drexel's play."

When William & Mary erased a 16-point deficit to tie Georgia State with 4:41 left, the host Panthers turned defensive and made four consecutive defensive plays to lead to six points and move on to a 57-52 win.

Georgia State (11-10, 3-7) led 28-25 at halftime and started the second half with 13 consecutive points to open a 41-25, 16-point advantage with 15 minutes to play. But, William & Mary answered right back with a 21-4 run to take the lead at 47-45 with 5:35 to go. Ashley Watson made two free throws for GSU to tie the game at 4:41. That's when GSU's defense stepped up with two steals, a tipped shot and a forced travel to set the tempo and get transition baskets and re-open a 53-47 margin.

William & Mary had one last chance when Emily Correal scored to make it 55-52 with 1:13 left. GSU missed three shots and William & Mary got the ball with 2.3 seconds left. A hurried three from Janine Aldridge was no good and GSU got the rebound and added two free throws.

GSU's defense finished with 11 steals and 18 forced turnovers, plus three blocked shots. GSU scored 22 points off the turnovers. The Panthers limited William & Mary to 29.5 percent shooting and 4-of-21 from 3-point range (19%). GSU got the last rebound of the game to finish with a 44-43 advantage.

Georgia State was led by guard Kayla Nolan, who tied a personal-best with 17 points, including seven points in the final four and a half minutes. Kendra Long added 11 points and four steals. Center Cody Paulk was solid with eight points, a team-best seven rebounds, a team-best five steals and three blocked shots. GSU knocked down 17-of-21 free throws at an 81 percent rate for some key second half points.

William & Mary (5-16, 3-7) got a sterling game from forward Emily Correal, who scored 22 points and grabbed eight rebounds. Kyla Kerstetter led the second-half rally with 12 points and a pair of treys.

"The defense won the game for us tonight," head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener noted. "We played with a lot of heart and fortitude and it was good to get another home win. We didn't shoot well, but the key defensive stops and hustle made the difference."

Hofstra shot 50 percent overall and 50 percent outside the 3-point line in rolling to a 72-59 win over Georgia State.

Hofstra (11-11, 7-4) kept their transition game alive with 21 assists, one shy of a season high, with 13 assists by point guard Andreana Thomas, which was one shy of the all-time school record. While Thomas was scoring (eight points) and making assists, the Pride was making 3-point shots, including a perfect 3-for-3 from Asia Jackson off the bench and a perfect 2-for-2 from forward Anma Onyeuku. Hofstra finished with 29-of-58 from the field and 8-of-16 from beyond the arc to tie their season most.

In the final two minutes of the game with Hofstra up by 13 points, senior forward Shane Evans got three lay-ups and six points to finish with 19 in the game and 11 rebounds. That last basket gave Evans 2,001 points and made her the seventh player in CAA history with 2,000 points. The league leader in double-double games, Evans has 64 in her career.

Georgia State (11-11, 3-8) couldn't get the ball in the basket, starting 4-for-20 shooting and finishing 19-of-54 for 35 percent. The Panthers compounded the poor shooting with careless turnovers (22) that led to 26 Pride points.

GSU got a career-high 20 points from point guard Ashley Watson, while Kendra Long added 18 points with four 3-point baskets. Cody Paulk led in rebounding with 13 caroms to go with three blocked shots. Paulk leads the CAA with 58 and has 191 for her career now, seventh most in CAA history.

Hofstra jumped out to a quick 9-3 lead in two and a half minutes and GSU's coach pulled all five starters. The five reserves chipped away and head the game back to 12-9 at 12:22. Then, Hofstra began taking advantage of the reserves with a 10-0 run that built a 22-9 lead with 9:41. Coach then put the five starters back in the game after sitting on the bench for almost 10 minutes.

Hofstra's largest lead of the first half was 14 points, but GSU cut that down to 36-31 at halftime when Long drained a 3-pointer with two seconds left.

The second half started much the same as the first, as Hofstra roared back with a 11-4 run to open a 45-33 lead after the first five minutes. GSU cut it back to eight points at 47-39 with 13:34, but five quick Hofstra points opened it back to 13 points at 52-39.

GSU's defense held a ninth opponent to under 50 points by limiting Towson to 29.4% shooting and just 1-of-14 outside the 3-point arc.

The Panthers were trailing 11-7 with 10:30 in the first half when they caught fire and outscored the Tigers 26-7 in those next 10:30 with Long making five 3-pointers in that run that led to a 33-18 halftime lead.

In the first four minutes of the second half, GSU began with a 10-5 start to make it a 20-point lead at 43-23 and the game was never in doubt. GSU built a 30-point lead at 4:12 as all 10 Panthers had a rebound tonight, nine of the 10 scored, eight of the 10 had an assist.

"This was a complete team win because all 10 players did things to help us win," Coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "We competed to win tonight and worked together as a team on both ends of the court. We had more assists than turnovers and usually if you do that, you win the ball game."

"Kendra was on fire in the first half and some of the extra shooting we have been doing may have paid off a little for us," Baldwin-Tener continued. "The players were doing what we asked of them and responded with energy and effort to get a complete win and get us back above .500 again."

GSU had 18 assists and 17 turnovers for that +1 stat and also held a 42-34 rebound advantage over Towson.

Kendra Long had a great two-game series with Towson this year, scoring 23 points in the win at Towson and 20 tonight. She scored her 20 points in 29 minutes tonight as the reserves got plenty of action.

Long upped her career 3-point total to 149 made as she closes in on the school record of 154 for a career.

Sophomore forward Maryam Dogo came off the bench to pull down a game-high 9 rebounds, while scoring 5 points in her 20 minutes.

UNCW came from 10 points down in regulation to force OT and didn't lead in the second half or overtime until the final basket with 5 seconds to win 84-83.

Visiting Georgia State controlled the game, leading by 10 points with 9:41 to play (61-51) and still led by nine points 73-64 with 2:25. But, a lot of unusual things had to happen for UNCW to force the OT and they did it at 73.

In the five-minute OT period, GSU jumped back up by five points at 78-73 with 3:39 when Tiffany Anderson, who had scored the first four points in OT, fouled out.

GSU led by four points in the OT with 18.8 seconds left, but UNCW drained a trey with 8 seconds from Jessica Freeman, Tawanna Lee made a steal and then a lay-up with 5.1 seconds. GSU's final shot was contested hard, but the shot bounced off the rim.

On her radio show, coach Baldwin-Tener deflected discussion on calls, by saying "I can't answer any questions about officiating. I'll just say we played tough, we played hard, we played with energy and with effort, but we didn't get the result we wanted."

Sophomore guard Ashley Watson led GSU (12-12, 4-9) with 16 points with five assists and four steals. Freshman Ashlee Cole added 13 points off the bench and Tiffany Anderson scored 10 points before fouling out. Center Cody Paulk had 10 rebounds, nine points and four blocks despite game-long foul troubles, playing only 28 of the 45 minutes.

UNCW (3-20, 2-10) got 27 points from senior guard Jessica Freeman, including 6-of-9 treys. Senior forward Karneshia Garrett finished with 22 points, 20 rebounds and six blocks in her 43 minutes.

Both teams made 10 3-point baskets in the game. GSU forced 16 UNCW turnovers and made 10 steals on defense. The game had 13 lead changes and five ties. UNCW gained an advantage at the FT line, making 20-of-24 (83%) to 13-of-16 by GSU.

GSU had a season-high 22 offensive rebounds, with Paulk grabbing seven to give the team second opportunities.

Georgia State forged a 38-34 halftime lead by making 8-of-16 first half 3-point shots with six players making a 3-pointer. But, UNCW stayed close by making 6-of-12 first half 3-pointers.

Northeastern used a 14-2 run to start the second half to turn a 27-24 halftime lead into a 41-26 lead and go on to a 65-50 win over Georgia State on Thursday night at Solomon Court.

Ashley Watson scored 12 points and Kendra Long added 10 more to pace GSU (12-13, 4-10) on a cold-shooting evening (19-of-55, 34.5%). The Panthers were just 4-of-20 outside the 3-point line (20%).

In the first half, the score was tied six times with five lead changes.

Northeastern (14-10, 7-6), who leads the CAA and is No. 11 in the NCAA with 8.2 3-point baskets a game, hit its average tonight with 8 treys. Kashaia Cannon led the way with 5-of-7 outside the arc and 18 points. Jewel Tunstull added 18 points in the paint. This was NU's Think Pink cancer awareness game.

GSU started strong with a 13-6 lead through five minutes and had a 15-8 lead at 11:26 when foul trouble and an injury slowed the progress. Cody Paulk and Maryam Dogo, GSU's only two post players each had three fouls in the first half, while top scorer Kendra Long got two fouls in her first five minutes. And starter Tiffany Anderson left the game after just seven minutes with a knee injury and did not return.

Back-to-back treys after the 15-8 GSU lead propelled NU to a 10-0 run to gain the lead at 18:15. GSU had its final lead at 22-20 with 5:23, even though there were two more ties, the last at 24 with 3:14 in the half. NU added a bucket a free throw late to take a 27-24 halftime lead.

Three more NU treys to start the second half sparked that 14-2 start and GSU could never recover.

All told, starter Anderson logged seven minutes, starter Paulk got just 23 minutes and was cautious with foul trouble and starter Long had just 25 minutes. The bench played 79 minutes, with the four first-year players using 63 of those minutes. Many times the Panthers utilized five guards, causing some confusion as some had to play in an unfamiliar role that affected the defensive sets and the offensive plays.

Kendra Long's 2-for-4 shooting outside the 3-point line up her career total to 153 made, one shy of tying the GSU school record and two short of breaking it. Cody Paulk had one block, leaving her with 197 and three short of becoming just the seventh player in CAA history to block 200 shots.

Georgia State had four players in double figures, including senior Cody Paulk, in a 67-51 Senior Day win over George Mason at the GSU Sports Arena.

Georgia State forced 22 turnovers, made nine steals and scored 26 points off of turnovers to energize the winning effort today.

In a game that included 10 ties in the first half, GSU broke from a 30-30 tie to go into halftime with a 38-32 lead on a rainbow 25-footer from Kendra Long. To start the second half, GSU struck with a quick 10-2 burst to open a 48-34 advantage with just under 14 minutes to play.

Georgia State (13-13, 5-10) had multiple leaders in the win. The lone senior who played, Cody Paulk, had 13 points, six rebounds and two blocks. The blocks up her season total to 66, one shy of the school season record, and her career total to 199, meaning her next one makes her only the seventh player in CAA history to record 200 blocks. The team's other senior, Tiffany Anderson, injured her knee in Thursday's game and will not return for the final three games.

Junior guard Kendra Long added 15 points, including 4-of-7 outside the arc. Those four upped her career total to 157, breaking the old career mark of 154 3-point baskets of Kelcey Roegiers-Jensen (2003-07).

Sophomore guard Kayla Nolan, moved out of the starting line-up today, responded by coming off the bench to score a game-high 18 points on 5-10 field goals and 7-of-8 free throws. Sophomore guard Ashley Watson had a career-best eight assists to go with 10 points to be the fourth Panther in double figures.

George Mason (8-18, 3-12) got 14 points and nine rebounds from Amber Easter.

"This was what you would simply call a good team win, since so many players did so many things to help get the win," coach Baldwin-Tener said. "We did a much better defensive job and that was the biggest key. Cody had another good game and a great senior day. Kayla took better shots and was smarter and aggressive. Kendra was hitting some big shots at big times. Ashley was distributing the ball great today."

GSU improves to 10-6 at home this season. The 82% free throw shooting marked a four time in the last five games the team shot better than 80% from the line.

This was the middle of a four games in eight days stretch for Georgia State.

After 12 ties and 10 lead changes, William & Mary's reserve Taylor Hilton launched her only 3-point attempt of the game with 44.9 seconds to lift the host Tribe to a 77-73 advantage. William & Mary added a final lay-up for the 79-73 win in a free-scoring game with both teams hitting 48 percent.

Through the final five minutes of the game, it was a one-point game three times, with visiting GSU having multiple chances to take the lead back. But, the Panthers couldn't convert, including one costly 30-second shot clock violation. GSU missed its final six shots of the game over a 3:34 span, converting only two free throws for points at 2:51.

GSU's Cody Paulk was solid with 13 points (6-of-8), 10 rebounds and a personal-best tying 6 blocked shots. She now holds the school season record with 72 and becomes the 7th player in CAA history with 200 blocks (205 now to move into 6th place all-time).

Three other Panthers scored in double figures with 11 points each from Ashley Watson and Kendra Long, plus 10 from Ashlee Cole.

William & Mary, a good 3-point shooting team, cashed in 8-of-19 tonight. The CAA leaders in steals (10.7 per game) made 11 thefts of the Panthers.

Janine Aldridge became the 5th player in CAA history to make 300 3-pointers with 3 more tonight as part of her game-high 19 points to go with six steals. Kyla Kerstetter came off the bench to add 17 points.

Both teams shot well from the free throw line as well, the Tribe hitting 11-of-12 for 92% and GSU 13-of-16 for 81%.

During the see-saw affair with the 10 lead changes, the Tribe had opened the largest lead of the game at 10 points (40-30 on the first basket of the second half). But, GSU came charging quickly back with an 11-2 run to set up the battle to the wire.

"We did a lot of good things, came back when we got down and played hard, but he had too many turnovers to win a ball game," head coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "This is a tough game to lose, but it is tough to win on the road if you make mistakes."

Georgia State held a 37-30 rebound advantage, including 15 offensive rebounds. GSU forced 17 William & Mary turnovers and made nine steals. Georgia State made 14 of its first 18 shots in the second half and finished that half with a 55.2 shooting percentage.

Georgia State saw Drexel win its 20th game with a 58-49 decision Thursday in the last CAA game in the Sports Arena.

The scrappy Panthers were leading 30-26 with 18:33 to play, but visiting Drexel caught fire from the outside and went on a 17-0 run to take a 43-30 with 13:36. GSU re-grouped to close back to five points at 47-42 with 5:47 and again at 50-45 with 4:30 left, but Drexel's Hollie Mershon finished off her 23-point night with a couple baskets to secure the 20th win for Drexel.

GSU seemed dominant at times and got off 14 more shots than Drexel (63-49), but shot just 19-of-63 on the night (30.2%). The Panthers banged the glass and held a 42-35 rebound advantage with 18 offensive rebounds and second chances. The hustling Panthers forced 13 turnovers and made eight steals against a team that is No. 5 in the nation in fewest turnovers. They even blocked four Dragon shots. But, it all came back to the poor shooting.

"The team had a lot of intensity and I liked that, but we didn't shoot the ball well enough to get the win tonight," coach Sharon Baldwin-Tener said. "There were a lot of easy ones in the paint we should have made, but at least we kept getting rebounds and trying. We wasted so many opportunities."

Drexel, No. 13 in the NCAA rankings in fewest points allowed at 51.7, held a ninth straight opponent to 55 or fewer points. Tonight's game had five ties and five lead changes.

Georgia State (13-15, 5-12) got 15 points from junior guard Kendra Long, including 5-of-9 outside the arc. Sophomore forward Maryam Dogo had 13 rebounds and eight points, while senior center Cody Paulk pulled down 11 rebounds, scored seven points, made seven assists and blocked two shots.

Drexel (20-7, 13-3) was led by All-CAA guard Hollie Mershon, who had 23 points, six rebounds and three assists. Freshman Meghan Creighton added 12 points on 4-of-7 outside the arc.

Drexel, who is No. 31 in the nation in 3-point percentage, found the range at a 45.5 rate outside the arc with 10-of-22, meaning they were only 9-of-27 on two-point shots. Drexel was 5-of-9 outside the arc in the second half, including four straight during their 14-0 run. The Dragons had made 26 consecutive free throws as a team over three games and added two to that tonight before a miss.

DELAWARE 86, GEORGIA STATE 49

In Georgia State's final game in the Colonial Athletic Association and Senior Night for host Delaware, the host Blue Hens ran away with an 86-58 win before 5,092 at the sold out Bob Carpenter Center.

Led by senior All-American Elena Delle Donne, Delaware jumped out to a 16-0 start in the first five and a half minutes and the game was never in doubt. Delle Donne scored seven straight to spark that run, finished the first half with 19 points and marked her regular season finale with 24 points in just 17 minutes of action because of the score.

The Blue Hens had a 21-point lead in the first 10 minutes of the game (31-10) after their sixth early 3-point basket in those first 10 minutes. Delaware made 8-of-14 treys in the first half and finished the evening with a school-record 12-of-23 3-point baskets. UD started the game making nine of its first 15 shots with four treys in the first eight minutes.

The win was No. 16 Delaware's school-record 22nd consecutive of the season and 37th straight CAA win as the Blue Hens improve to 27-3 overall to head into the conference tournament.

Delaware got 15 points from senior Lauren Carra (4-of-5 treys) while senior Danielle Parker led with 12 rebounds. Delaware has seven seniors.

Georgia State finishes its final season in the CAA with a 13-16 slate. The Panthers didn't finally get the ball in the basket until 14:21 in the game on a shot by Cody Paulk, starting the game 0-for-7 from the field. GSU was just 1-for-13 from the field through the first eight minutes. The Panthers shot just 30% in the first half (10 for 33) and 38% for the game.

Junior Kendra Long led Georgia State with 14 points and six steals. Senior center Cody Paulk added 12 points, six rebounds and three blocks as she was the lone senior playing for GSU.

Paulk finishes with school records in blocks for a season with 77 blocks and for a career with 210 for a career. The 210 are fifth most in CAA history and the 77 are tied for sixth most in CAA history for a season.

Watson set a GSU school record for free throw percentage for a season (.875) with 4-for-4 tonight and 70-of-80 for the season. Long ended the season with two 3-pointers to up her GSU career mark to 165, as she returns next year for her final season. She ended the year with 54, her third straight year over 50.
